## Knowledge

The Manchester Blitz occurred over Christmas in 1940, setting Piccadilly ablaze  
172,000 children were evacuated from Manchester over 3 days  
Gas masks were given out and used by adults and children  
People used Air raid shelters  
Women took different jobs, some in a munitions factory  
Food supplies were affected  
Communities changed  
Lancaster bombers were made in Manchester  
Rolls Royce manufactured aeroengines for fighter planes

## How do Rivers shape landscape and lives?

### Essential vocabulary

<i>source</i>	the origin (beginning) of a river
<i>continent</i>	a landmass made up of different countries
<i>hemisphere</i>	the earth is divided at the equator into two halves- the northern and southern hemispheres
<i>scale</i>	representing the real size of something in a smaller way (on a map)
<i>dam</i>	a barrier built to hold back water (which forms a reservoir)
<i>environment</i>	the surroundings or conditions in which a person, animal, or plant lives
<i>Latitude/longitude</i>	Latitude and longitude are a system of lines used to describe the location of any place on Earth.
<i>delta</i>	an area of land formed by fertile soil carried there by the river
<i>equator</i>	An invisible circle around the earth with a latitude of 0m, lying equidistant from the poles; dividing the N and S hemispheres

Question	Essential Knowledge
How do maps and atlases help us find out about the world?	The world is split into Northern and Southern hemispheres with seven continents. Latitude and longitude are imaginary lines which circle the Earth and allow us to describe the position of places.
What are the <b>natural</b> features of Africa?	Africa is a continent which covers 30 million square kilometres, it has varying natural features because of this such as mountains, deserts and savannah
Why is the Nile called the river of life?	The Nile is in Africa and is the longest river in the world. The water of the Nile allows people to settle and farm close to it.
