
Year 6

Our big question in Year 4 is 'Why is Antarctica so important?' Whilst the weather has been so cold, we have felt like we have actually been in Antarctica over the last few weeks so we decided to have a super learning day all about Antarctica. We carried out lots of different activities and we all had a brilliant day.

We had a visitor from Greenpeace who talked about the importance of Antarctica and told us about some of the animals that live there. We made sledging biscuits, which would have been used by explorers as a good energy source. They were really easy to make and everyone really enjoyed the taste of them too!

In the afternoon, we made a mural showing some of the animals that live in Antarctica, we drew whales, seals and penguins and made a great display. We also carried out an interesting Science investigation to find out how different animals like seals and whales stay warm in the freezing cold water. We used a bowl of ice and icy water, with one hand we wore a glove and then on the other hand wore a 'blubber glove'. We placed our gloved hand in the icy water and it felt really cold, then we tried out the same thing wearing a 'blubber glove' (a glove with a layer of fat inside it) and we could then keep our hands in the water for much longer. We found out seals and whales have a layer of fat underneath their skin which means they can stay in the icy water for a long time without getting fat underneath their skin which means they can stay in the icy water for a long time without getting too cold.

We wrote beautiful firework poems using different types of words. Can you spot an adjective? A verb? A noun? What about an adverb?


