#### Year 5: Just Do It!

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
As part of our Big Question for this half term ('What's so special about the USA?'), Year 5 have been studying the designs of Tinker Hatfield. Tinker is Vice President for Design at Nike, where he designed iconic trainers such as the Air Jordan and the Air Max. We looked at the way he draws inspiration from the world around him, from buildings and architecture to motorbikes and planes, to use in his designs. We also studied a selection of sports shoes from Mr Brown's trainer collection for ideas (thanks Mr B!). We then decided what features our sports shoe required, before sketching designs to meet this design brief. Lastly, we made a prototype of our final trainer design from clay. What do you think?!



#### **Year 2: What is it Like Down Under?**

Year 2 have had a very busy half term learning all about Australia. The children loved sharing a morning with parents in the classroom, decorating boomerangs, drawing flags and sharing some Australian foods. In English the children read a book called 'Wombat Stew' and we made a fire outdoors to have a go at making it ourselves, it looked completely disgusting so we decided to make a healthy stew instead. Next, our chopping skills and cooking skills were put to the test and the children developed a healthy stew using sweet potatoes, peppers and onions. They then wrote to our school chef to give her the recipe to try out. There was a mixed response to the stew tasting, many of our children might be found on Masterchef in a few years as they had some excellent ideas for improvements that could be made.



As well as all this, we even managed to fit in a trip to Manchester Museum where we looked at the live animals in the vivarium, and the fossils downstairs. We found lots of Australian animals whilst we were there and had a great time. The children were all really well behaved and we were so proud of them. 


#### **Year 4: Mountains of Work!**

Year 4 have been learning all about Mountains this half term. Using the book "Touching the Void", we have written newspaper reports and stories about mountain climbers. We have had some interesting conversations in P4C about friendships and about making difficult choices.

In Art we have studied an artist called Christa Rijneveld who creates images of mountains using only lines and circles. The children were intrigued by her work and have created some versions of their own. We sent some images of our work to the artist on social media and she was very impressed with the children's efforts.

## **Nursery: Can You Tell Me A story?**

Nursery's Big Question has been, "Can you tell me a story?" so we have been learning all about traditional tales. At the start of term the Three Little Pigs ran through our classroom to collect bricks, sticks and straw but they were soon in trouble when the big bad wolf turned up and the two little pigs went missing. The children helped by making missing and wanted posters and the wolf was soon caught by the policeman. When we thought our hard work was finished a BRO-KEN chair appeared in our classroom ... who could it be? Goldilocks maybe?! The children ex-



plored this story and helped make porridge for each bear thinking about the different sizes (*small, medium and big*) and quantity (*more, a lot, less*). The children have been telling us their own stories which adults have scribed and then together we have acted them out. We have also been counting to 5, recognising numerals to 5, talking about parts and whole and using a five frame to solve problems. ### **Year 6: Not Long Now....**

With just over 4 school weeks left before SATS, Year 6 have been working extra hard! In Maths this half-term, Year 6 have already been focusing on Percentages, Algebra, Ratio, Position and direction. We are now focusing on geometry. The children have been working very hard in the run up to their SATs, with many showing a great Growth mindset during extra revision sessions.

In English we are beginning to write spooky stories with flashback, which we will be putting into a book of Y6 stories at the end of term for parents to enjoy. We are using a mixture of film (see the Year 6 blog for more details and some questions to think about!) and another Novel called 'The Nowhere Emporium' to inspire our writing styles, as we examine how different authors use themes and suspense to engage their reader.

In science, year 6 have continued to find out about systems within the body.

In particular, we learned about the digestive system and have had much

fun demonstrating how it works!


In between all the hard work, they have visited Manchester Central Library to learn from real life author Steve Butler and enjoyed

How do you think we can embed these values in our schools?










# **Year 3: Ancient Egyptian Trip**

On the trip the children listened really well and shared some really interesting facts that they has learnt about Egypt.
