Year 2: Learning about the Great Fire of London

This half term, children have been learning all about the Great Fire of London.

At the start of this half term the children went on an exciting trip to Staircase House in Stockport. The children had a fantastic time and dressed up as Samuel Pepys, Jane the Maid, King Charles II, soldiers and maids. The children had the opportunity to re-enact the main events of the Great Fire of London. Afterwards children designed their own fire marks and worked with their partner on wattle and daub.

The children have been really enjoying this topic and have joined in with lots of exciting activities, such as, writing diaries, role play and art work. After half term we will learn about Australia.







Year 4: When in Rome!



It's been another busy half term in Year 4. We have been learning about the Romans as our history topic, trying to answer the questions: Where they came from? How they arrived in Britain? Why they



came here? We have done some Geography work, looking at ancient Rome and learning about the places that the Roman Empire conquered. In Computing we have been using our coding skills to make animations showing where the Roman Empire reached. We

had a very successful trip to Chester where all children enjoyed being soldiers, marching through the streets and visiting the amphitheatre where we practised our battle skills. It was really interesting seeing where the Romans lived and being able to handle some artefacts. We learnt a lot about the river and the impact that had on invaders and settlers. The children all had a great day.

In Science we are looking at Teeth and Digestion, and have been thinking about how to look after our teeth. We have been learning about how we digest our food as well as looking at food chains. In PSHE we have been work-



ing hard with the rest of the school looking at Dreams and Goals: how they are achievable, what we have to do to work towards them and the obstacles we might find that could slow us down.

In English we have been looking at historical narratives and diary writing, we have linked this to our Roman topic using a book called 'Escape from Pompeii' to relate our historical and geographical knowledge to our writing. After half term we will be learning about mountains.


Mr Watson has been awarded an O.B.E.

Next term our big question will be, 'Can you tell me a story?' You could start reading some traditional fairy stories or stories from your own culture at home!




Reception: What do you know about dinosaurs?





Year 3: How did metal change early people's lives?



Year 3 became archaeologists the half term when we had a visit from Rob at Theatre Workshop. All the children had a fantastic time looking for and exploring objects from The Iron Age and answering questions for our topic, 'How did metal change early people's lives?'.

'Clarene' the archaeologist guided through our 'dig' and what amazing ancient objects





learnt how The Iron Age began and how it ended (those pesky Romans). From the big cheers at the end it was clear that the children had a wonderful and engaging time.

Year 6 have been reading Pig Heart Boy by Malorie Blackman – our class author - and have written diaries and persuasive letters in role -showing the dilemmas of the book from different perspectives. We have also made comparisons between the books and the TV dramatization. Pupils have drawn and created water-coloured pictures of the heart. The children have used lots of new technical language linked to science.


In science, we have been asking, "Why don't humans live forever?" We have been studying systems in the body and finding out all about the heart and its functions. In order to investigate what affects our pulse rates, we are being quite active!

Who will be the fittest, we wonder...?

In R.E, we have looked at the similarities and differences between places of worship in Christianity and Islam. We have also looked at the work of charities in the two faiths and have considered in P4C how people of faith should spend their money.

During our topic sessions this half term our big question has been 'Are we a United Kingdom?' We started by learning how the differ-


ent countries of the Union formed into the United Kingdom. We have investigated the different languages within the UK as well as the variety of accents. We found out about the different capital cities of the UK and discussed what makes a capital city unique from a regular city. To finish we will be focusing on Northern Ireland, learning about the 'Troubles' and asking the children to answer the question: Should Northern Ireland remain part of the United Kingdom.





Year 5: The Kingdom of Benin







This half term Year 5 have been learning all about the fascinating history of the Kingdom of Benin! At the start of the topic, we listed all the things that came to mind when we thought about Africa. These ideas included deserts, tribes people, lions, elephants, hot weather, etc. We have since learned that the Kingdom of Benin was a wealthy and technologically advanced civilization, with an abundance of power and creative arts! In our own Art, we have been researching, designing and making masks in the West African tradition. In our PE, we have been learning traditional Egyptian dance, which the pupils have really enjoyed. We look forward to sharing these with parents soon! After half term we will be learning about the U.S.A.
